- 1. A long, straight wire with a diameter of 10 mm carries a current of 40 A.
  - a. What is the magnitude of the magnetic field at 15 mm from the axis of the wire? (9 pts.)

$$B = \frac{\mu_0 T}{2\pi\pi} = \frac{4\pi \times 10^{-7} \times 40}{2\pi \times 15 \times 10^{-3}}$$
$$= 5.33 \times 10^{-4}$$

b. What is the force on an electron  $(q = -1.6 \times 10^{-19} \text{ C})$  15 mm from the axis of the wire moving parallel to the current with a speed of 3 x 10<sup>6</sup> m/s? (8 pts.)

$$\vec{F} = g \vec{\nabla} \times \vec{B}$$

$$F = 1.6 \times 10^{-19} \times 3 \times 10^{6} \times 5.33 \times 10^{-4}$$

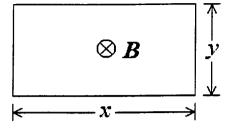
$$= 2.56 \times 10^{-16}$$

c. A second, long straight wire is parallel to the first with its axis a distance of 15 mm from the other's axis and carries a current of 10 A in the opposite direction. What is the force on a unit length (1 m) of this wire? (8 pts.)

$$F = I_2 l B = 10 \times 1 \times 5.33 \times 10^{-4}$$

$$= 5.33 \times 10^{-3}$$

- 2. A single-turn rectangular loop is oriented perpendicular to a uniform magnetic field of 0.5 T. The dimensions of the loop are x = 30 cm and y = 15 cm.
  - a. What is the magnetic flux through the loop? (8 pts.)



$$\bar{P} = BA = B \times M$$
= 0.5 × 0.3 × 0.15

b. Assume the length of the loop is changing at a rate of dx/dt = 4 cm/s. What is the emf induced in the loop? (8 pts.)

$$E = \frac{4\pi}{3} = B / 3 \frac{4x}{4x}$$

$$= 0.5 \times 0.15 \times 0.04$$

$$= 0.003$$

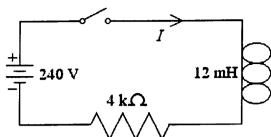
c. If the loop has a resistance of 0.5  $\Omega$ , what force is required to expand the loop at a rate of dx/dt = 4 cm/s? (9 pts.)

$$F = I l B = \frac{\mathcal{E}}{R} M B$$

$$= \frac{0.003}{0.5} \times 0.15 \times 0.5$$

$$= 4.5 \times 10^{-4}$$

- 3. The switch in the circuit below is closed at t = 0 when the current I is zero.
- a. What is the magnitude of the potential difference across the inductor at 6  $\mu s$  after the switch is closed? (9 pts.)



$$V_{L} = V_{o} e^{-R t/L}$$

$$= 240 e^{-4000 \times 6 \times 10^{-6}/0.012}$$

$$= 32.5$$

32.5 V

b. What is the current I at 6 µs after the switch is closed? (9 pts.)

$$I = I_{o}(1 - e^{-Rt/L})$$

$$= \frac{V_{o}}{R}(1 - e^{-2})$$

$$= 0.0519$$

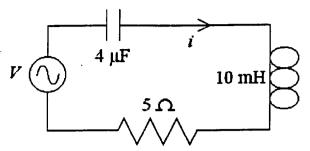

c. What is the current I after the switch has been closed for a long time? (7 pts.)

$$I = \frac{V_0}{R} = \frac{240}{4000}$$

$$= 0.06$$

- 4. The series RLC circuit below contains a sinusoidal voltage source  $V = 10 \sin \omega t$ .
- a. For what value of  $\omega$  is the current i a maximum? (8 pts.)



$$\omega = \frac{1}{\sqrt{LC}}$$

$$= \frac{1}{\sqrt{0.01 \times 4 \times 10^{-6}}}$$

$$= 5000$$

b. At the frequency calculated above, what is the peak voltage across the inductor? (9 pts.)

$$V_{L} = I\omega_{L} = \frac{1}{R}\omega_{L}$$

$$= \frac{1}{5} \times 5000 \times 0.01$$

$$= 100$$

c. At the frequency calculated above, what wavelength electromagnetic wave is emitted by the circuit? (8 pts.)

$$\lambda = \frac{C}{f} = \frac{2\pi C}{\omega}$$

$$= \frac{2\pi \times 3 \times 10^8}{5000}$$

$$= 3.77 \times 10^5$$
